The full-size launching tubes are of impressive scale.

The monument that symbolizes Katakai, the birthplace of Sanshakudama fireworks, is open to visitors 24 hours a day. The launching tube used to launch 420-kilogram Yonshakudama fireworks is 5.2 meters long and 1.8 cm thick, made of steel, and is particularly eve-catching. Try to capture the fireworks and the monument in a single photo for a great Instagram shot.



The front and back of the literary monument are inscribed with the handwriting of Ryotaro Shiba, who depicted the life of Kawai Tsuginosuke in his novel "Touge." The book was made into a movie in 2022. Address: West end, Koshi-no-Ohashi Bridge, Takanashi-cho, Ojiya City

Achieving education where everyone can learn The first public elementary school in Japan opened here

Born into a merchant family dealing in Ojiya-chijimi fabric, Hiroki Yamamoto actively advocated for the importance of education for children, and that everyone should have the opportunity to learn. He gave up his private fortune to open Japan's first public elementary school, Shintokukan (now Ojiya Elementary School), in Gochi-in.

Ojiya-chijimi fabric

Considered of outstanding quality, Echigo linen was presented to the Shogun during the Edo period. Around this time, Ojiva-chijimi fabric was born, characterized by the unique crispness of its warp yarn, powerfully twisted to produce a wrinkled texture known as shibo. This superior handcrafting technique is designated as an Important Intangible Cultural Property of Japan and is also registered as a UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage.

Popular for their smooth texture and firm bite. A specialty dish from a town of textiles

Hegisoba noodles use a seaweed called funori as a binding agent. It was also used to glue down the threads when weaving Ojiya-chijimi fabric, unique to this textile-weaving town. The word hegi derives from a square plate-shaped container.

I was so surprised at the beauty of the blotchy Ojiya-chijimi fabric when it was exposed in the snowy fields! This tradition keeps the wisdom of our ancestors alive, just like *hegisoba* noodles made with funori seaweed
