Ojiya City is located almost in the center of Niigata Prefecture, and Japan's largest river, the Shinano River, flows through the city.

Ojiya-chijimi hemp fabric, which is registered as a UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage, Nishikigoi carp, a local city and prefectural ornamental fish of national recognized importance, and the tradition of ushi-no-tsunotsuki bull sumo, a nationally designated Important Intangible Folk Cultural Property, are all traditions, culture, and techniques handed down from our predecessors. In terms of industry, the manufacturing industry for precision machinery and electronic parts is thriving, and in terms of agricultural products, the cultivation of Uonuma Koshihikari rice, cauliflower, watermelons, and melons is flourishing.
